Out and About – What the members have been up to.

Cody has sent in three pics of a trifecta, being a red deer, a fallow and a pig. Variety is the spice of life they say. Cody has some new hunters in training.







As can be seen from the front page, Cody also took a Rusa stag with his bow, which is even more impressive. That deserves high praise indeed.



James and Dan had a week out west chasing pigs in July. Despite being winter and quite cold weather at times, the pigs were coming into the dams from mid-morning and right through to evening. Also, mobs of pigs could be seen out feeding at all times throughout the day, which was a bit out of the ordinary on this property. Some mobs numbered up to 20 pigs. The owner had cleared pig blocks of scrub a few years ago and planted oats, so there was some self-sowing oats and native grasses to bring them out. They took around 60 pigs and must of seen 300 - 400 pigs in the week. On one three kilometre long old oat crop, they saw five separate mobs out one mid afternoon, which must of totalled 80 to 90 pigs. Stalking in on the first mob resulted in a few pigs down and the rest bolting back to the scrub. That seemed to be the norm. Stalk in on a big mob, get an easy one down and then a couple more on the run, but most would escape. Bring back the days of the semi autos and 30 round banana magazines.


















So for the new members out there learning about cartridges for game, what is a good pig cartridge? The answer is pretty easy......whatever you are using on the deer. Any cartridge of .257 inch and above, of moderate velocity and with a decent mid weight cup and core bullet will handle pigs well. James and Dan used a .270 (130gn Speer SP), a 6.5x55 (127gn RWS SP), a 6.5-284 (140gn Hornady SP) and James also used a shotgun with SGs, which worked well in the scrub. Simples.

That last photo is probably the best of the lot. As I get older the number of animals taken becomes less important and spending time in the bush with mates for a few days seems reward enough.

PS. Just to fill this space up. One funny incident occurred on the last night. As we came back to the quarters in the home paddock at 11:00pm, a good boar ambled across in front of the car, lit up by the headlights. He was only 60m from our quarters and the farm dogs were only 100 metres away. The boar seemed totally unconcerned with everything and then proceeded to meander over to a water trough and take a leisurely drink, all the while lit up with the driving lights with the idling vehicle 30 metres away. Satisfied, he gave us one more glance and then walked off back to the wild. The cheeky bugger!
