# MEETING, SATURDAY 1<sup>ST</sup> NOVEMBER

John Toohey has been good enough to write up a comprehensive summary of the day at Simon's.

### Deer Carcass Breakdown & Making Sausages

At the June Southern Branch meeting hunter and professional chef Simon Kalis invited members and friends to his rural hideaway for a demonstration of sausage making. Simon makes sausages, snack sticks and salamis with venison and wallaby. On that night Simon had brought along a selection of his wares for the members to sample. The samples disappeared quickly.

Taxidermist, hunting guide and former professional butcher Murray Thomas also volunteered to come along on the day to demonstrate how to professionally break down a whole deer carcass.

The appointed day was Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> November when 30 members and friends witnessed the demonstrations, asked a multitude of questions and were treated to a fine BBQ of venison sausages, hamburgers and a venison neck casserole. Two doe carcasses were provided by member Jack Bearman assisted by Neil McCormick and hung in Matthew Bedelph's cooler trailer; head shot and immaculately clean.

Thankfully the day was bright and sunny with little wind, so the exercise was undertaken on a large table outdoors. Hygiene was paramount.

Murray broke down the carcasses with great expertise describing the knife cuts and uses for the cuts of meat as he progressed – roasts, casseroles, steaks, schnitzels, mince and more.

Simon had pre-prepared 5kgs of venison having them part frozen which helps the meat to grind easier and any sinew or silver skin to flow through the smallest setting on the grinder without wrapping around the mincer shaft. The next step was adding pork fat and his preferred herbs and spices plus a little, very carefully calculated and weighed, quantity of Curing Salt #1 or Prague Powder No. 1 containing sodium nitrite – to preserve the meat in the sausages and prevent organisms such as botulism from infecting the meat. This curing salt is poisonous in large quantities so calculating and weighing the correct amount is critical. The quantity to add per kg is usually written on the packet. When following the instructions, nitrite is quite safe. To help ensure the cure powder is evenly distributed in the mix Simon dissolved the powder in about 500 ml of cold water and adding his spices and milk powder as a binder. The ingredients are then thoroughly mixed – the venison, pork fat and cold water containing the cure and the herbs and spices.

Using a Misty Gully 5 litre hand sausage filler and collagen casings Simon made about five metres of 20 mm snack sticks and then proceeded to low temperature hot smoke lengths for many hours thus slow cooking the sticks and adding a smoke flavour. On occasions Simon uses deer intestines for his sausage casings, washing them thoroughly, and not wanting to waste any part of wildlife he has taken. A skilled game meats chef and ethical hunter, that's for sure.

#### JOHN TOOHEY'S RECIPE

I have personally been making venison kranskys and sausages for a number of years. Being an ignoramus when it comes to herbs and spices, I cheat. I purchase Corona pre-mixes from Spice Pantry (at <a href="https://spicepantry.com.au">https://spicepantry.com.au</a>). A myriad of flavours including kransky, herb and garlic, leek & bacon, honey & rosemary and many more. Branded Corona. Some flavours have rising strengths of chilli. The pre-mixes contain the necessary preservative, in this case sulphites instead of nitrites, in a correct proportion to salt, flavours and a binder. All the maker has to do is measure the correct weight of mix for the weight of meat (venison or wallaby, and pork fat) and dissolve it in cold water and mix. I leave my mix in the fridge overnight to cure before further mixing with cold water to a sticky consistency then filling the sausage casings. I prefer and use Misty Gully natural hog casings in sizes 28 and 36. Hog casings need to be rinsed overnight in cold water and wet on the inside to help them slip onto the filler tube. This is easily done by slipping one end of the casing onto a bottle of cold water and squeezing some water down inside the casing. There's no need to soak or wet collagen casings. Simon uses collagen as he likes the crisp bite.

A note on water. From everything I've read use only bottled water, not tap water as it contains chlorine & fluoride, and keep the water and your mixtures below 4 degrees C. That's why Simon was wearing warmer gloves underneath his hygienic thin nitrile or vinyl food handling gloves when mixing. Maintains some feeling in the fingers.

#### **EQUIPMENT**

Most hunters probably have a mincer of some sort. Electric mincers make life much easier than the old hand mincers. Many mincers come with sausage filling tubes however I found my mincer works too fast for me to control the skin filling and ended up with an inconsistent mess. I also tried a \$40 small hand filler but that was hopeless. I ended up with a 5 litre Misty Gully hand filler from Smoked and Cured (https://www.smokedandcured.com.au), the same as Simon's, and its excellent. Takes about 3 kg of meat at a time and easy to wind the handle with one hand and control the filling skin with the other. More fun with a mate!

The two websites I've mentioned have a wealth of information on sausage and jerky making and of course there are a hundred or more 'how to' YouTube videos to watch.

#### A Note on Botulism

Botulism "is a disease caused by the micro-organism Clostridium botulinum" said the co-host of the Food Safety Talk podcast. It only grows in the absence of oxygen such as in a sausage. Hence the use of sulphites or nitrites to minimise the risk.

It is also common to freeze meats, fish, sausages etc. in vacuum sealed bags. The item is locked in an oxygen free environment in the bag. The longer it is left thawing in the bag the greater the risk of the botulism micro-organism starting to grow and becoming toxic. Botulism can cause vomiting, nausea, diarrhea, muscle weakness and difficulty breathing. It can lead to paralysis and in a worst-case paralysis of the lungs and suffocation. So, it would be wise to break the sealed bag as soon as possible after removal from the freezer and let the contents thaw in another container in a refrigerator.

#### SIMON'S RECIPES

### Fennel snack sticks: (5kg batch)

3600g Venison

900g Pork fat

90g Salt

15g Sugar

10g Ground wild fennel seed

10g Ground black pepper

10g Garlic powder (or 30g fresh crushed garlic)

10g Onion powder

11g Cure #1

250ml water

Mince semi-frozen meat and fat on a fine plate (3mm), this will make it easier for the mincer to process any sinew and stop the fat from smearing.

Combine the dry ingredients and dissolve the cure in the water then add both to the meat and mix till the meat turns sticky, this is when protein extraction is achieved.

Leave chilled for at least 24 hours for the cure to activate.

Fill the sausage stuffer tightly making sure to keep air pockets to a minimum.

Fill mixture in 21mm or 23mm dry collagen sausage casings

Smoke schedule using applewood pellets:

60 degrees C for 2 hours

66 degrees C for 2 hours

Then 82 degrees C till internal reaches 68 degrees C

Chill down in cold water or better still ice bath once removed from smoker.

### BBQ Sausage: (5kg batch)

3600g Venison

900g Pork or Beef Fat

65g Salt

50g Sugar

45g Milk powder

35g Sweet paprika

20g Black pepper

10g Cayenne pepper

10g Garlic powder (or 30g fresh crushed garlic)

5g Mustard powder

10g Fresh sage

350ml Water

Mince semi-frozen meat and fat on a medium plate (5mm), this will make it easier for the mincer to process any sinew and stop the fat from smearing.

Combine the dry ingredients then add it plus the water and chopped sage to the meat and mix till the meat turns sticky, this is when protein extraction is achieved.

Fill the sausage stuffer tightly making sure to keep air pockets to a minimum.

Fill mixture in 23mm or 30mm dry collagen sausage casings.

### Burger patties:

800g Venison

200g Pork or Beef fat

16g Salt

10g Milk powder

10g Smoked paprika

6g Black pepper

6g Onion powder

6g Garlic powder (or 18g fresh crushed garlic)

35g Worcestershire sauce

35g Water

They call the back legs and most of the back leg segments "rounds" and other cuts different to us. You can see him clearly rollout what we call the round.

And boy, doesn't he have a sharp knife! Well worth watching.

# Deer Management Policy Review

The Department of Natural Recourses and Environment is conducting a review of the current deer management plan. The public have been asked to view their proposed changes and comment. John Toohey has prepared a response from the Southern Branch, and it has been submitted. It is reproduced below.

#### INTRODUCTION

The Branch supports the complete eradication of deer from DMZ3. Deer numbers are controlled by taking out does not bucks. It appears that there may have been a lack of effort by some hunters to take does to reduce populations. This may be from a lack of property access for keen hunters; hunters being restricted on the number of does they can take or hunters are simply not putting in the effort over the eight months of the doe season. Perhaps of course, hunters simply have competing priorities with families and sports etc. The complex regulatory system has largely evolved to enable policing of poaching and trespassing. While the Police follow up trespass there is little policing of poaching by rangers anymore. For years hunters have let the lowest common denominator direct deer regulation i.e. deer poachers. It's time for change to that scenario and streamlining however the Branch is certainly not supportive of any measure that helps facilitate deer poaching which also involves trespass, property damage and illegal firearm use. There needs to be a clear distinction in the vernacular between hunting and culling under permits (shooting).

#### **POLICY MEASURES**

The Branch supports the reduction of permit types to two for application Statewide as follows: 1. Combine antlerless deer, wallaby and possum into one five-year permit [effectively a spot lighting permit], and 2. A separate single permit for male deer in DMZ 1 and DMZ 2 outside the traditional season. No permit required to take deer in DMZ3 unless spotlighting. All deer hunters/shooters regardless of Zone to be licensed. The Branch does not support the taking of female deer in any zone during the fawning period from December to March. It is a serious animal welfare issue. Members were not aware of a restriction in taking only "inferior" heads under permits in DMZ1 and the requirement to sever antlers above the tres tine. In the Branch's opinion both measures are unnecessary. The requirement for annual take returns should continue as compulsory for deer, wallaby and possum for management purposes.

#### **COMPLEMENTARY MEASURES**

#### Measure 1

In DMZ3 remove hunting seasons and bag limits (and associated tagging) for hunting licence holders. While permits in DMZ3 allow unrestricted, 365-day take of deer, hunting licence holders (who do not have access to hunt on a property under a PPP or a SPWP) are restricted to taking only one male deer during the open season. Removal of these limits could further contribute to the DMZ3 objective of 'complete eradication'. The Branch's very strong view is that deer must be eliminated from DMZ3. It is agreed that licensed hunters in DMZ3 not be limited in the number of male or female deer that they can take. No closed season on males but a closed season on does from mid-November to mid-March.

It needs to be recognised in developing Statewide rules that deer in the Highlands can differ in biological timing to those in the Midlands and elsewhere. The Branch does not support the taking of does during the fawning period regardless of where the does are located. For around the first two months from birth (December – January) does hide their fawns. Does are lactating at least to the middle of March. The Brian Murphy project identified that fawns losing their mothers in March can survive independently. It is appreciated that deer survival in DMZ3 is not the end game but members think that the animal welfare consideration of fawns slowly starving to death is a significant animal welfare issue. Starvation is not an accepted practice with domestic animals; it attracts formal charges; what's the difference with wild animals?

To take deer in DMZ3 hunters must be licensed. Deer hunters in DMZ3 to hold the landowner's written permission to access property to take deer. Hunters may already have a relevant landowner's written permission specific to the property for firearms licensing purposes or it could be simplified with a downloadable form. This would greatly assist with the policing of trespass and help validate the possession of DMZ3 deer. NRE needs to consider with the Government the development of regulations to enforce the eradication of deer from DMZ3. Anecdotally the members are aware of properties with deer present in DMZ3 where landowners will not allow deer hunting at all. Game Services Tasmania needs to continue to prioritise the removal of deer from peri-urban areas.

#### Measure 2

In DMZ1, introduce a new condition that clarifies that female deer can be taken during the fawning period of mid-November to end February provided every reasonable effort is made to locate and humanely kill any dependent young of antlerless deer taken. Taking female deer is seen as critical to reduce the effective breeding population and to reduce deer numbers. The condition would also balance with any potential animal welfare concerns about lactating does and fawns. Relevant Animal Welfare Guidelines would be updated in consultation with the Tasmanian Game Council and the Animal Welfare Advisory Committee.

This is not supported on an animal welfare basis for reasons outlined in Measure 1 above. At best, it is surmised that most hunters would only put in a cursory effort, if at all, to locate and despatch orphan fawns. It's one thing to spot a fawn, it's altogether difficult to despatch it, especially if running. The chances of finding a young hidden orphan fawn at night are near zero.

#### Measure 3

In all zones, extend the male season from five weeks to seven weeks (or longer) with timing determined in consultation with deer hunting representatives. The Branch certainly does not support an extension of the male season beyond say the 5th of April at the latest. Hunters supported the Brian Murphy project initiated by ADA and the TDAC in order to apply science to the deer management regime through Quality Deer Management, endorsed by Government, and emphasising the taking of does to manage herd numbers. Brian Murphy identified from his extensive data collection that on a Statewide basis the peak of the rut is the 17th April or thereabouts. By April males are croaking, become careless in a wild animal sense and it becomes too easy to hunt them. In just one year, the older mature males would disappear and herd quality set back 30 years. With hunters focussed on taking two males (in preference to females) herds would once again tend to be dominated by breeding females having the capacity to multiply and expand quickly. For example, now, across the Highlands in DMZ1 very few males live longer than 4.5 years i.e. not to maturity.

#### Measure 4

In relation to the requirement in DMZ1 to tag all mature male 'stags' shot under licence remains but increase the number of tags from one to two per hunting licence holder (which can be used in any zone). The continuation of tags is supported for males older than spikies taken during the March season.

An increase to two tags per season is not supported. It is by far preferable that hunters take does rather than a second male. Herd numbers are controlled by taking does not males. A scientific fact. Ordinary hunters taking two males in March are highly unlikely to take does within the following month or more. The members recognise that it's ludicrous that in 2023 around 2,500 adult males were taken by licensed hunters while around 15,000 were taken under permits (Game Tracks 2025 Pp 38 & 39). Members suspect that the bulk of the permits were for culling bachelor herds destroying crops. It is also assumed that the permit tally includes males taken in the commercial shooting trial for the venison trade (males give the greatest venison weight and hence return per animal). In our view it is likely that bachelor herds from May through to February are the principal male deer problem. These "bachelor" males disperse far and wide in March/April until the survivors start to return in May. There are not necessarily bachelor herds on every property. Where a bachelor herd is a problem then allow the landowner to control numbers by permit. The priority must be on taking does to reduce deer numbers. This accords with all Brian Murphy's work and the principles of Quality Deer Management.

#### Measure 5

In all three zones consider legalising recreational hunter take of deer at night, with the assistance of a detection device (artificial light or thermal), and from a conveyance, under a hunting licence, provided it would not unduly increase the risk of antisocial behaviour or policing concerns. This is not supported. Absolute no. This is a "lazy" option. Members are stunned it has even been put forward. It would encourage flaunting of the firearms legislation e.g. shooting from public roads and exacerbate trespass. There are also safety concerns for hunters and others on private and especially public lands. Members do support a single 5-year combined permit for taking antlerless deer, wallaby and possum utilising spotlights. The permit could also authorise the use of thermal devices if such authority is required – members are not aware of any regulation that prohibits the use of thermal devices now. It is likely that their use is currently fairly common. The permit holder should be given the ability to fill-in shooters copies of the permit – name, address, permit number, by a fillable, downloadable NRE form on PC.

Tags not required for the deer. Require the permit holder to report the spotlighting take of each species annually. Take returns to inform deer, wallaby and possum management plans. No spotlighting at all on public lands except on special permit issued by Parks & Wildlife or Sustainable Timber Tasmania.

#### Measure 6

Remove the requirement to label deer parts when removing deer from a property, taken under permit. Currently the Regulations require that a person taking deer under a Permit must not remove the head, or sever the body, of a deer at a location other than the usual residence of the holder of the licence under which the deer was taken, unless all products of wildlife relating to the deer have been labelled. Changes over time mean this requirement is redundant. Removal of this condition would reduce red tape for hunters and could provide flexibility for hunters with what parts they take home and addresses difficulties in disposing of a full carcass off site. Members agree although it refers only to deer taken under permit. Why not all deer? Taking full carcasses home was an historic requirement to aid in the policing of poaching and is problematic for hunters living in towns and the suburbs.

#### **FURTHER MEASURES**

- 1. Increased recreational hunting access to public lands is supported.
- 2. Members support no new deer farms being approved in DMZ3 and DMZ2. The Government was warned back in the 1980s that deer farms should be prohibited outside the historic traditional range and predicted exactly what has happened with deer now being at multiple localities across the State.
- 3. The Branch does not object to bow hunting but think it's unlikely to receive Government approval given the extensive media reporting of events of recent years involving wallaby and a wedgetail eagle in southern Tasmania.

#### PROPERTY BASED GAME MANAGEMENT PLANS

To gain permits landowners must have a PBGM plan. These need not be complicated. Can serve the dual purpose of outlining the landowner's wildlife objectives, property entry and activity rules for hunter entry and insurances.

# NEWS FROM CARLO DI FALCO, THE SFF MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT

### Carlo Di Falco calls for compromise and collaboration on deer management

Lyons MP, Carlo Di Falco, has moved a successful motion in the House of Assembly in his first private member time. The motion was supported by the Government, opposition, and most independents (27-7) calling on the Government to adopt a more practical and balanced approach to deer management. One that recognises the cultural importance of hunting, supports regional communities, and reduces waste through the responsible use of harvested game meat.

It is disappointing that certain members of parliament are not interested in practical solutions. 'SFF' is about common sense and working with the community to ensure the deer population is sustainably managed. The Greens Party in particular want to wave a magic wand and eradicate the deer population. 88% of the deer population is in Zone management 1, which is mainly Sustainable Tasmania Timber Land. We have pushed the government to allow expanded access to hunting which will sustainably manage the population. The Greens didn't support this.

The Government has created a haven for deer in public land areas and restricted hunting access which could successfully manage the risk of damage to our World Heritage Sites, landowners and farmers.

Mr Di Falco said recreational hunters play a vital role in managing Tasmania's deer population, contributing over \$80 million to the state's economy each year while supporting local jobs and small businesses across rural and regional areas.

"Hunting has always been a part of Tasmania's heritage," Mr Di Falco said.

"It's time the Government recognised hunters not as a problem, but as part of the solution. They are the frontline of effective deer management."

"We should be supporting methods that are humane, sustainable, and community driven. Aerial culling is not only expensive, it divides communities and wastes opportunities to use game meat responsibly." Mr Di Falco is urging the Government to review legislation that currently prevents the donation of harvested game meat to charitable organisations, a restriction, he says, ignores the reality of food insecurity in many Tasmanian households.

"It makes no sense that perfectly good venison and wallaby is going to waste when local charities and food banks are struggling to meet demand," he said.

"With a common-sense approach, we can safely and responsibly allow harvested meat to support those who need it most."

The motion further calls for expanded access to public land for recreational hunting, ensuring a fairer and more effective statewide management strategy.

"This is about striking the right balance, protecting our environment, respecting private property, and empowering local people to manage wildlife responsibly," Mr Di Falco said.

"SFF is willing to work with all sides of parliament and stakeholders to ensure sustainable wildlife management

Recently, Shooters, Fishers and Farmers put out some advice you must do in the event the Police seize your firearms. Given what has happened in the past, this is very good advice. Robert Borsak, the Upper House Member in NSW has produced a short video on YouTube telling us what is important. It can be found by typing in, "Police Seizing Firearms". His advice is as follows.

- 1. Be polite and calm at all times, don't let Police bully or coerce you.
- 2. Get the Officers name and badge and record it in writing. Ask for a business card if they have one.
- 3. Get a full receipt before the Police leave. It must list all the firearms seized, the make and serial number, the reason for seizure, the event number, the date and time and the Officers signature.
- 4. Remove your scopes from your firearms, they are not gun parts and you do not want them damaged.
- 5. Case your firearms in protective cases, gunbags or even wrapped and taped in blankets.

They advise that if you contact the local area police commander in writing you should be able to retrieve your firearms in 28 days. If you have issues doing this, contact you local SFF representative for support and advice.

I recently purchased this safety sling from a distributer in Victoria. It is a simple friction strap that attaches to your existing sling and the butt of your rifle. It secures the rifle to your back, so it is firmly held in place. If you are like me and like to walk out to your spot in the dark and often walk back in the dark after sunset, it allows you to walk safely with both hands free without having one hand holding your rifle on your shoulder. It is released with a quick release buckle and doesn't take much longer than you would normally spend taking your rifle off the shoulder. For sneaking into position, your rifle can be secured on your back without it flopping around getting in your way. It seems to be well made with quality materials. These normally retail for \$99. but I have spoken to the distributer and if we can get enough orders, he is prepared to offer a significant discount. Regards, Kurt WALK'N'STALK walknstalkstore.com There is currently a review of Public Land that may be suitable for opening up to deer hunting. The following information has been provided by Scott Freeman, the Tasmanian ADA State Coordinator.

Tasmanian Public Land Deer Hunting Project

The TDAC, ADA & SSAA have been working with NRE over the last period towards opening Public Lands controlled by NRE and or Parks. Parks are currently undertaking site inspections and audits to ensure they are suitable to be released for deer hunting and if any times of the year, restriction may apply.

At this stage we are looking at including these new areas into the current Hunting Ballot Program run by NRE for the Stag Season and then open for general antierless deer hunting after the Stag Season. This is still to be confirmed as the lower graded areas may just be opened for Deer Hunting for the Seasons. All is on the table currently, until we get a feel on interest from hunters and the quality of hunting on each block.

We are also asking members that are willing to assist in an assessment program to assess sites for suitability for deer hunting to contact us and we can supply more information and resources to help us grade these areas with suitability for hunting and level of deer numbers.

### Safety requirements for conveying other firearms

The following are safety requirements for conveying a firearm that is <u>not</u> a prohibited firearm:

- (a) the firearm is to be in the unloaded condition;
- (b) ammunition is to be in a closed container, completely separate from the firearm;
- (c) magazines are not to contain any ammunition;

### At least <u>one</u> of the following requirements is to be met:

- (i) the firearm is to be in a locked receptacle;
- (ii) the bolt of the firearm is to be in a closed container, completely separate from the firearm;
- (iii) the firearm is to be fitted with a mechanism that locks or disables the trigger or action and prevents the firearm from being used.


