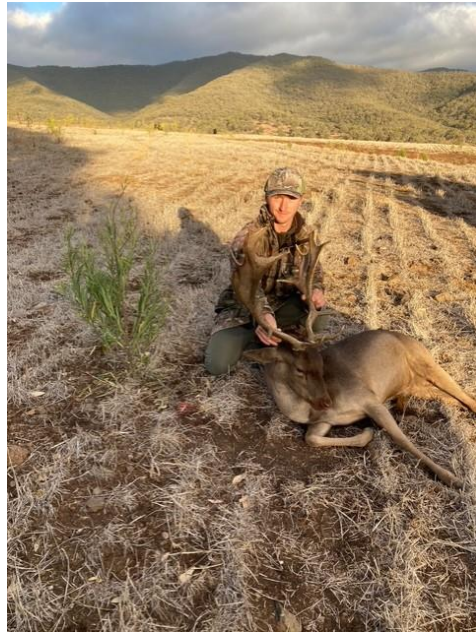

CARLO'S NEWSLETTER

FIREARMS FUTURE PLANS

Carlo Di Falco, our Shooters, Farmers and Fishers representative in State Parliament is regularly sending out a newsletter to all interested stake holders. Not everyone will receive Carlo's newsletter, but we have been given permission to reprint articles in our newsletter that apply specifically to hunting and firearms from Carlo and his team. We thank Carlo for allowing this and his articles will be reprinted exactly as he has issued them without comment from our editor.

The following is a reprint from an interview Carlo had with a local newspaper and clearly reflects his mission to hold the Government of the day accountable for any decisions and changes in policy that adversely affect deer management in Tasmania.

Media Release – Carlo Di Falco, Member for Lyons, 2 June 2026

Concerns Raised Over Government's Deer Management Direction

Member for Lyons Carlo Di Falco has welcomed long overdue reductions in red tape for deer hunters but says the Government's latest reforms raise serious concerns about animal welfare, landowner rights, and the future of deer hunting in Tasmania. Mr Di Falco said hunters and farmers had been calling for practical reforms for years and deserved credit for pushing the Government to act.

"Simplifying permits and removing unnecessary bureaucracy is a positive step."

"Hunters have been frustrated by a system that often made it harder to manage deer while offering little benefit for conservation or population control."

"Those changes are welcome, but that does not mean we should simply accept every other proposal without scrutiny."

Mr Di Falco said he strongly opposed the decision to allow the harvesting of does throughout the entire year.

“Population management is important, but it must be balanced with animal welfare.”

“There are legitimate concerns about dependent young being left behind and those concerns should not be dismissed.”

“We can control deer numbers without abandoning the ethical hunting standards that Tasmanian hunters pride themselves on.”

Mr Di Falco also raised concerns about changes affecting Zone 2 and the reduced ability for landowners to manage herds according to local conditions.

“Farmers and landowners live with the impacts of deer every day.”

“They understand herd numbers, seasonal conditions and the pressures on their properties.”

“The last thing we should be doing is taking decision making away from the people on the ground and replacing it with a one size fits all approach.”

Mr Di Falco said he was particularly concerned by the broader direction of the Government’s deer policy and any suggestion that deer could eventually be reclassified.

“I do not support the reclassification of deer.”

“There is a significant difference between managing deer populations and fundamentally changing the status of deer in Tasmania.”

“What concerns many hunters is that some of these changes appear to be part of a gradual shift towards treating deer solely as a pest species.”

Once that door is opened, it becomes much easier for future governments to further restrict hunting opportunities and diminish the value of deer as a game species.”

Mr Di Falco said public land hunting opportunities and access to Sustainable Timber Tasmania land must remain a central part of Tasmania’s deer management framework.

“Hunters make an enormous contribution to deer management on public land and Sustainable Timber Tasmania properties.”

“Any future reforms must strengthen, not weaken, hunting opportunities on those lands.”

“If deer are increasingly viewed only as a pest to be removed, there is a real risk that the interests of recreational hunters will be pushed aside.”

“That would be a mistake both from a management perspective and for the thousands of Tasmanians who participate in hunting responsibly every year.”

Mr Di Falco said he would be closely involved in the upcoming consultation process and encouraged hunters, landowners, and regional communities to make their voices heard.

“The Government must listen to the people who are actually managing deer populations and spending time in the bush.”

“I will be participating in the consultation process and advocating strongly for a balanced outcome.”

“We need less red tape, more practical management, continued access to public land and STT properties, respect for landowners’ rights and a commitment that deer will remain recognised as an important game species in Tasmania.”

Carlo also had this article printed in his latest newsletter



I've been clear that the annual deer cull in the Central Plateau Conservation Area should have started earlier. Delaying the program from 27 April to 4 May meant colder late-autumn conditions had already set in, making deer harder to target effectively and giving them the advantage over hunters. While the Government says the program aligns with the Tasmanian Wild Fallow Deer Management Plan 2022–27 and has committed an extra \$2.25 million over three years to support deer management efforts, timing remains critical if we want to see real results.

The cull itself involves volunteers from the Australian Deer Association and the Sporting Shooters Association of Australia working under government supervision, alongside the use of monitoring cameras around the Walls of Jerusalem National Park to track whether deer return to protected areas after the operation.

Recently, Shooters, Fishers and Farmers put out some advice you must do in the event the Police seize your firearms. Given what has happened in the past, this is very good advice.

- 1. Be polite and calm at all times, don't let Police bully or coerce you.**
- 2. Get the Officers name and badge and record it in writing. Ask for a business card if they have one.**
- 3. Get a full receipt before the Police leave. It must list all the firearms seized, the make and serial number, the reason for seizure, the event number, the the date and time and the Officers signature.**
- 4. Remove your scopes from your firearms, they are not gun parts and you do not want them damaged.**
- 5. Case your firearms in protective cases, gunbags or even wrapped and taped in blankets.**

In Tasmania, as distinct from NSW, you must apply to the Firearms Division of Tasmania Police to find out when and how you can get your firearms returned.

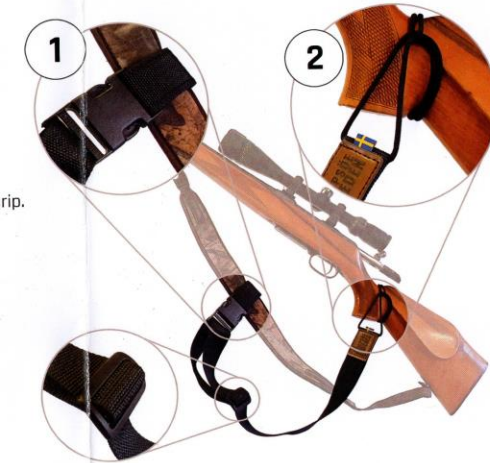

Safety Gun Strap consist of two parts:

1: Short strap with friction rubber and quick release buckle. It is assembled around the regular gun sling.

2: Long strap with paracord, adjuster and quick release buckle. It is assembled around the stock or pistol grip.



I recently purchased this safety sling from a distributor in Victoria. It is a simple friction strap that attaches to your existing sling and the butt of your rifle. It secures the rifle to your back, so it is firmly held in place. If you are like me and like to walk out to your spot in the dark and often walk back in the dark after sunset, it allows you to walk safely with both hands free without having one hand holding your rifle on your shoulder. It is released with a quick release buckle and doesn't take much longer than you would normally spend taking your rifle off the shoulder. For sneaking into position, your rifle can be secured on your back without it flopping around getting in your way. It seems to be well made with quality materials. These normally retail for \$99. but I have spoken to the distributor and if we can get enough orders, he is prepared to offer a significant discount. There will be one at our next meeting so members can have a look and see what they think.

There is currently a review of Public Land that may be suitable for opening up to deer hunting. The following information has been provided by Scott Freeman, the Tasmanian ADA State Coordinator.

Tasmanian Public Land Deer Hunting Project

The TDAC, ADA & SSAA have been working with NRE over the last period towards opening Public Lands controlled by NRE and or Parks. Parks are currently undertaking site inspections and audits to ensure they are suitable to be released for deer hunting and if any times of the year, restriction may apply.

At this stage we are looking at including these new areas into the current Hunting Ballot Program run by NRE for the Stag Season and then open for general antlerless deer hunting after the Stag Season. This is still to be confirmed as the lower graded areas may just be opened for Deer Hunting for the Seasons. All is on the table currently, until we get a feel on interest from hunters and the quality of hunting on each block.

We are also asking members that are willing to assist in an assessment program to assess sites for suitability for deer hunting to contact us and we can supply more information and resources to help us grade these areas with suitability for hunting and level of deer numbers.

Safety requirements for conveying other firearms

The following are safety requirements for conveying a firearm that is not a prohibited firearm:

- (a) the firearm is to be in the unloaded condition;**
- (b) ammunition is to be in a closed container, completely separate from the firearm;**
- (c) magazines are not to contain any ammunition;**

At least one of the following requirements is to be met:

- (i) the firearm is to be in a locked receptacle;**
- (ii) the bolt of the firearm is to be in a closed container, completely separate from the firearm;**
- (iii) the firearm is to be fitted with a mechanism that locks or disables the trigger or action and prevents the firearm from being used.**
