Measuring Course.



Out and About – What the members have been up to.

Cody's Rusa Hunt.

I found myself down the south coast for a last minute hunt. My mate John had eyes on a 32 inch Rusa stag and twisted my arm to get down for a crack at him. So I packed the car with bow and rifle and headed down with only one day to find him and get the job done. Rules for the hunt were simple only use the rifle when we saw the big stag or one of equal size. But any deer that would be in bow range would be considered fair game due to an over abundance of hinds and the fact I hadn't yet taken a Rusa with my bow.

In the morning we found ourselves watching a young mob of bachelor stag's feeding and roaring. We stayed on them waiting to see if there was a larger animal hanging around but nothing appeared until we noticed them making their way towards us. John suggested I nocked an arrow and get into position of what might be a good shooting lane. I did as was told and ranged a nearby bit of bush to get a reference for distance and got a range of 32 yards. In doing so I noticed the biggest stag was rutting hard and on the tail of the hind. The hind passed my shooting lane so I drew back in anticipation that the stag would follow and sure enough he did. John made a hind call to pull the stag up and allow me to let loose the Kayuga trizot dropping the stag with an unexpected or unplanned spin shot. I quickly nocked another arrow and sent it into his chest to finish him off. With that I managed to secure my first archery rusa and my second deer species with the bow. A handsome 24 incher. I did find the 32 incher later that day but unfortunately it wasn't meant to be as I seemed to have used all my luck on the archery deer. But still amazing what you can get done in a day.

Water Buffalo.



Dan had a trip out looking for a trout with the opening of the NSW trout season. He went to a stream that was devoid of trout the season before, but as that system had a flush through it in the winter, he thought things may have improved. He was relieved to see three trout in the first hole he came to and thought great, the trout have come back. But then he walked the next four kilometres without seeing another one. The water level was starting to get low which is not good for early October. Despite weather forecasts predicting above average rainfall through spring and early summer, consistent rain seems to be erratic again at the moment. According to NSW Fisheries, these streams are stocked annually, but with dry summers and low, warm water levels it is questionable whether the fingerlings survive. Dan did get a 6lb carp on his #2 weight rod which was a consolation of some sorts.
